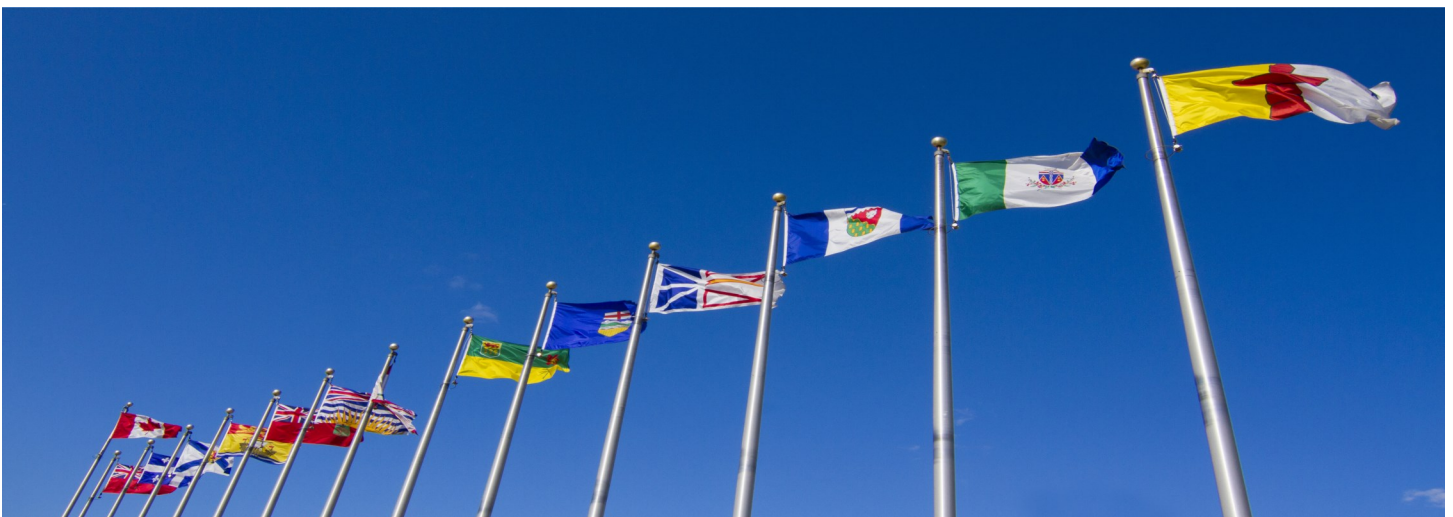

HONOURING 2021 RETIREES



Claudia Kurzac (BC) grew up in the suburbs of Campbell River and after graduation left for the bright lights of Vancouver to follow the romantic dreams of being a public health inspector. She actually conducted her first EHO field practicum in 1979 with what was then the City of Vancouver Health Department (where she spent her time chasing after Gypsy moths).

After graduation from BCIT in 1980, she landed her first job in Winnipeg where she held the coveted title of being only the second female EHO in the Province of Manitoba (where she spent her time chasing after skunks). The one good thing about Winnipeg was meeting and marrying her husband, Robert. In 1992, the couple relocated to Vancouver with the intention of staying for a couple years before moving to a smaller community. However, the allure of city living kept her doing district inspection work until 1999 when she started her rotation in the communicable disease program.

In 2005, Claudia was promoted to a Senior EHO and assigned to the Tobacco Enforcement program. In 2006, she moved to the Community Care Facilities Licensing program and worked there until 2008. In 2009 Claudia volunteered to complete a one year interchange with the Public Health Agency of Canada in the Professional Development program working on a number of projects including assisting public health disciplines in the development of discipline specific competencies. During the interchange, the H1N1 influenza outbreak hit and she was further seconded for a time to the infectious disease branch working on the development of guidance documents.

In 2011 Claudia took on an acting-EH Manager role tasked with working on the development of a report for the Chief MHO in support of a tanning by-law for the City of Vancouver that would ban people under the age of 19 from using tanning beds (prior to the province bringing in a provincial regulation). After 21 years in Vancouver, in 2013 Claudia was finally appointed as an EH manager for the Richmond office. In Richmond she was exposed to a broader scope of EH practice and blossomed in her new role. She built a very cohesive and well-functioning team to meet the demands of the Richmond community.

Along the way she also found time to promote the profession as BC Branch President (1999-2004) and National President (2004-2008) for the Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors (CIPHI). Thank you Claudia, we are truly grateful that you were able to share 29 years with VCH. You have proven yourself to be a hardworking, dedicated and committed leader. It has been a privilege to have worked alongside you and I very much appreciated the support that you provided both as a Health Protection Leadership Council member and as a friend. You have always been outspoken on Environmental Health issues and more so when supporting your staff in Richmond. Have a great retirement and look after Robert and Nellie.

Paul Markey (BC) was born in Halifax, a town in the county of West Yorkshire in the north of England and was brought up in the nearby city of Bradford. To this day, he still supports Bradford City Football Club even though they play on a gravel field with a half pumped ball. Paul attended Leeds Polytechnic where he earned his Bachelor of Science Honours Degree in Environmental Health. Shortly after he became a member of the Chartered Institute of Environmental Health. His first position was with Bradford Metropolitan Borough Council where he worked in housing, food and Health & Safety. There he earned his qualifications as a red meat, poultry, and fish inspector. Of note is that at the same time, the 'Yorkshire Ripper' (an infamous mass murderer in the UK) was on the loose in the very same streets.

After a few terrorising years, the Ripper was caught and imprisoned (Paul played no part in the arrest). For a short time, Paul took a leave of absence from this job to undertake a secondment as a Public Health educator in Nepal. Paul then took a position in the private sector working for the Food Hygiene Bureau. One of his duties while working in this position, was being responsible for inspecting the ferries that cross the Irish Sea between Scotland and Northern Ireland. Paul later returned to Bradford Metropolitan Borough Council where he was the Senior EHO leading the pollution team focused on air quality.

Paul married his wife, Helen in 1989 and in late 1992, early 1993 they decided to leave their jobs and travel the world for 12 months. Their travels took them to India, Sikkim, Nepal, and North America including the North-west Territories, the Yukon and British Columbia. They were living in a pickup camper van in Golden Ears Provincial Park with the intention of flying to New Zealand to look for work. Unfortunately for them (but fortunately for us) they ran out of money and decided to look for work in British Columbia.

In 1994 Paul was offered a job with the Central Fraser Health Unit (actually begged for it) and worked as a student EHO, where he completed a 12 month EHO student practicum. (Although Paul was certified to work as an EHO in the UK, he had to requalify by taking the Canadian CIPHI exams). Paul started working for Vancouver Coastal Health in 1995 as an EHO in the North Shore office, before being promoted to the Chief EHO.

Paul and Helen's two children, Sarah and Ethan were born in Canada and have Canadian accents. In 2005, Paul and his family moved back to the UK for just over 12 months to look after family matters. During this time, he worked as an EHO for Craven District Council in North Yorkshire, and it was while working here that he first met and worked with John Pickles, who now works in our North Shore office.

On returning to Vancouver, Paul worked in the North Shore office, becoming the manager when the Health Protection program was regionalised. In 2013, during restructuring of the Health Protection program, he moved to the Vancouver office to become the manager of Environmental Health. He held this position until 2014 when he became the Regional Manager of Community Care Facilities Licensing on Greg Ritchey's retirement. Paul is also a volunteer member of the North Shore Rescue team and quite often does a day at work after being out all night rescuing lost hikers on the North Shore mountains (and has become somewhat of a television star).

Thank you Paul for your many contributions to Health Protection over your 25 year span here at VCH (I'm thinking there might have been more if we could have understood you). You showed us how a level head and the desire to do good for people could move mountains in the field of Community Care Facilities Licensing. You have established a great team and virtually a new program in Licensing and I only wish that you could stay around to see the fruits of your labour.

It is our great pleasure to nominate Maxine Marchenski for the 2021 Alex Nilsson Award for volunteering. Maxine is a 1974 graduate from the BCIT Public Health Inspection/Environmental Health Program.

Shortly after graduating Maxine started her career in public health with the Northern Interior Health Unit in Prince George and joined the Institute at that time. After several years gaining valuable experience in a rural setting Maxine applied for a position as a Public Health Inspector with the Capital Regional District providing public health services to Greater Victoria and the lower portion of Vancouver Island. Being closer to the operating center of the BC Branch Maxine soon volunteered and was elected as a Councillor on the BC Branch Executive.

Then after several years Maxine was elected as BC Branch Vice President. In 1981, the BC Branch proposed to host the 1982 National Conference to be held in Victoria, BC. The National executive accepted that offer and Maxine volunteered to be on the conference organizing committee and over that year and during the conference Maxine was a key volunteer.

In 1994, the BC Branch again volunteered to host the 1995 National Conference in Victoria and again Maxine volunteered to be a member of the organizing committee. The conference was truly great and Maxine was there assisting during the proceedings.

For many years, a Christmas luncheon was organized at a local restaurant by health agency staff and Maxine was normally part of the organizing and welcoming committee. It was so popular that not only did local inspectors attend but also Inspectors with Health Canada and the Ministry of Health headquarters. A large number of retired PHIs made a regular point of joining the festive occasion.

Not long after Maxine retired she volunteered to be a BC Representative on the CIPHI National Retirees Advisory Committee and is still a member of this committee. Unfortunately Covid arrived in Canada including BC and Greater Victoria. Contract tracing and enforcing health related orders and legislation regarding the operation of public premises has placed a significant burden and pressure on existing Health Inspectors. Maxine has taken a break from retirement and gone back to work to help out in the office dealing with the myriad of problems, complaints and questions that arise daily. It is clear to us that based on her spirit of volunteerism and dedication to her profession throughout her career Maxine Marchenski is a most worthy candidate to receive the Alex Nilsson Award for volunteering in 2021.

"Sid" Alfred Sidney Hester passed away at his home on Tuesday, January 23, 2018, in his 103rd year.

Sid was born in London England in 1915, the year Typhoid Mary was arrested and put in quarantine after spending five years evading public health authorities and causing several outbreaks. Sid dreamt of life in the new world, and got started with a work assignment in Canada at age 17. Perhaps Sid's greatest accomplishment to our field is the number of PHI's he has inspired and mentored that went on to have their own illustrious careers. One of these PHIs is his daughter Becky Hester who is now retired from York Region Public Health (ON).

CERTIFICATE NO. 99 ISSUED IN 1938 LLOYD DODGSON

Lloyd Dodgson was born in 1918. On January 3, 2021, he celebrated his 103rd birthday. Lloyd was profiled in the 2019-2020 issue of the Senator's Forum.

He received his Certified Sanitary Inspector designation in 1938. He was a WWII veteran carrying out public health inspections in England, Italy, Holland and Germany travelling by motorcycle.

Lloyd started his career as a PHI for the City of Toronto; then Lincoln Health Unit, and Stratford Public Health Department. He assisted with the creation of the Perth District Health Unit and became it's first Director. Regional Consultant, Ontario Public Health and 10 years as Environmental Health Consultant, Nursing Home Inspection Service, Ontario Ministry of Health.

Lloyd served as the CIPHI ON Branch President 1964-65. He also chaired the committee that setup and operated the annual in-service training for Ontario PHIs. Lloyd received his CIPHI 50 year membership award in 2009 and his son Dave was quoted as saying "the best father and role model a guy could ask for."

LOOKING BACK & FORWARD



After 44 years in public health it was time to retire! Looking back over those years, they were certainly both challenging and rewarding.

In the mid-70s and early 80s I spent 12 years with the Ontario Ministry of Health managing such projects as the drafting of the Health Protection and Promotion Act and the development of the first set of public health standards for Ontario's Health Units. Along the way I "picked up" a Diploma in Business Administration, and a Masters in Environmental Studies to complement my PHI credentials.

In the mid-1980s I moved back to local public health where I spent the next 20 years before retirement as the Director of Health Protection Services with the Halton Region Health Department. During that time I also obtained my Ph.D. In 2006 my wife and I moved to Wasaga Beach on the shores of Georgian Bay to start our retirement – a new career beckoned!

As a newly minted retiree thinking about how I would spend those "golden years" I decided that it would be appropriate to seek out opportunities that would make use of the experience and training I had gained during my working career while at the same time enjoying the freedom which retirement brings to spend more time with family and friends.

With this philosophy in mind I have had the good fortune to serve on a number of boards and committees which has allowed me to contribute to the community in a very positive way. Examples of my current volunteer activities include serving on the Board of the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit and the Board of the South Georgian Bay Community Health Centre. I'm also the Vice President of the Board of the Friends of Nancy Island and the Wasasaga Beach Provincial Park which manages a historical site commemorating the War of 1812 and a member of the Membership Advisory Committee of the local YMCA.

For the past 15 years since its inception I have served as Past Chair and current member of the Wasaga Beach Healthy Community Network which is an advisory committee to Town Council on active and healthy living and protection of the environment.

In addition to committee and board work I've also authored two books, one a work of non fiction "**Reunited**" and the other a work of fiction "**The Secrets of the Sleeping Lion**" both of which have been published.

Never let anyone tell you that retirement is boring. You're only limited by your enthusiasm and desire to make a difference.

REMEMBERING MICHAEL BRAGG, CPHI(C)



Michael "Mike" Bragg passed away on June 9, 2021, in his 75th year.

Mike graduated from Ryerson in 1968 and received CIPHI certificate number 1754. He started his career in Oxford County Board of Health, Woodstock, Ontario where he was a dedicated leader for 45 years, retiring in 2012. During his career he became the Director of Environmental Health and then went on to lead Oxford County as the Chief Executive Officer. Mike actively pursued continuing education, earning an undergraduate degree from Wilfred Laurier in 1977, and a master's degree in public administration in 1993.

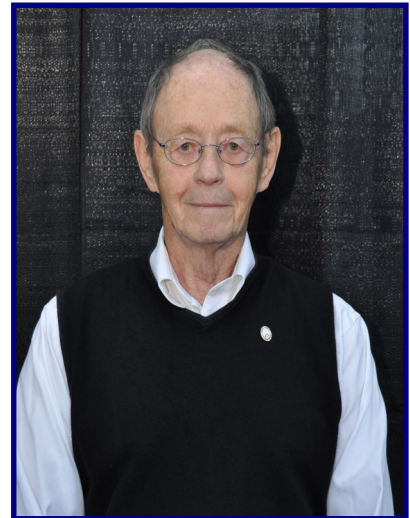
Mike served our profession as National CIPHI President first in 1984 and was re-elected in 1986 for another 2-year term and served as Past President until 1990. He was also Past Chair of the Association of Supervisors of Public Health Inspectors Ontario (ASPHIO). Mike received several acknowledgments for his dedication to our profession over the years. He received CIPHI Life Membership in 1993; the Award of Merit for Outstanding Achievement in Environmental Health in 2009; profiled in the prestigious "CIPHI 100 Members of Distinction"; and received his 50-year CIPHI member award in 2017.



Mike was known for his loyalty to the profession and passionately addressed the needs of the Institute to political and Ministry officials. All who had the pleasure of knowing Mike can speak of his tremendous commitment and devotion to the Institute and our profession. He was a highly regarded leader who was an outstanding role model for PHIs/EHOs. "Mike taught us the unlimited potential of being a PHI in a field that is increasingly Niels Dube said, His career is inspirational to all Public Health Inspectors that strive to go beyond the conventional norms of the occupation. His success literally opens up the skies for anyone that is, or becomes, trained as a Public Health Inspector. Mike taught us the unlimited potential of being a PHI in a field that is increasingly diverse."

REMEMBERING STAN COWAN, CPHI(C)



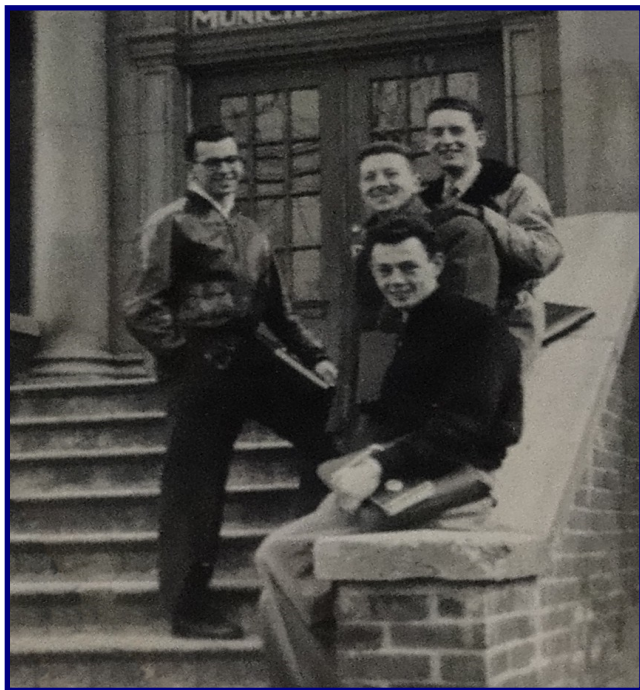
Stan Cowan was in the first day school program for PHIs in Canada and received his certification No. 874 in 1953. He started his career working for an Township of York Health Unit but early in his career he moved to the Ontario Ministry of Tourism where he was responsible for safe water at Ontario provincial parks and for handling other public health matters that arose throughout his career. Stan was instrumental in the carry-in/carry-out legislation for Algonquin Park. Stan was proud of his profession and served as a CIPHI Ontario Branch Councillor in the sixties. He was so pleased to connect with PHI colleagues at the CIPHI National AEC hosted in Blue Mountain in 2012.

His wife Alice described Stan as a quiet man with an incredible memory who loved living in the Blue Mountain area so he could ski every day. He was still skiing in his 80th year. When there was no snow on the mountain Stan would take a daily long walk or bike ride. He was also an avid reader and was common for him to get through a book in a day.

Stan was a terrific sailor as well and taught for sailing for 38 years at the Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons. His other interests were astronomy, weather and science. Music and animals also enriched his and Alice's life. He lived most of his dreams; built a little ski cabin at Craighleith; member of Reef Boat Club, skied on far mountains, and sailed on the ocean in waves as high as a house.

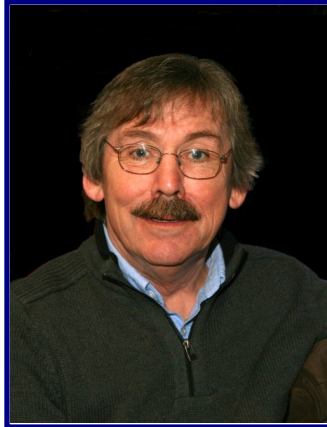

REMEMBERING BRIAN HALLEY, CPHI(C)



Brian was born in St. John's, Newfoundland. Brian graduated from Memorial University in St. John's with a Certificate in Occupational Health & Safety and worked in St. Anthony as a Medical Attendant. Several years later, Brian attended Ryerson University in Toronto and graduated in 1991 with his B.A.A. in Environmental Health and received CIPHI Certificate No. 3797 in 1992.

Brian then had the choice of employment in New Brunswick or BC so chose Beautiful BC. He enjoyed living in BC for over 25 years, working as a Health Inspector with the Caribou Health Unit in Williams Lake for several years before transferring to the Lower Mainland where he worked with the Fraser Health Authority in Coquitlam, Maple Ridge, and Abbotsford.

Brian was very concerned with the welfare of his colleagues and was a highly respected Shop Steward with the BC Government Employees Union. A good friend and colleague, Lorena McKay, said Brian loved to tell jokes even though he may have told them more than once before. He was a very kind person who wanted to help you in any way he could.

Brian retired from the Fraser Health Authority in September 2013 and not too long after moved back to his old stomping ground of Williams Lake. He was very proud of the fact that had finally purchased his own home in Williams Lake after years of being a renter.



Brian passed away peacefully at his home in Williams Lake, BC, on May 3, 2021. His Sister Patrice indicated Brian dearly enjoyed his visits home with his family and friends. Newfoundland was always near and dear to Brian and he shared stories of the great times with friends and at work.

They saved about 75 full applications for me and some specific information regarding another 200 or so. Attached is the latest one I have reviewed and now scanned. It is likely the most interesting application I have come across. You will note on the first Page his application is dated July 17, 1947. You will see Mr. Powell was "Self Educated" and fought in WWI. Now he is a person it would have been most interesting to interview about his various careers.

Tim Roark is an example of an outstanding volunteer who has been giving back to our profession for decades. His passion is catchy as he has recruited many of his colleagues over the years to volunteer for several CIPHI's committees and positions.

Tim received his CPHI(C) number 1690 in 1967 after graduating from Ryerson and started his career in Northwestern Ontario. In 1969 he moved to BC, working in several communities across the Lower Mainland and Fraser Valley. In 1979 he was appointed Chief Public Health Inspector and subsequently Manager for Environmental Health Protection in the Central Fraser Valley Health Unit.

Tim retired after 37 years of public health service in 2004 from government but not the profession. He established Tim Roark & Associates, Environmental Health Consultants. He has been BC Branch and National President of CIPHI. He was the Canadian Representative with NSF International for 25 years. He is a Founding Member of the BC Board of Registration; CIPHI Retirees Advisory Committee; and the Environmental Health Foundation of Canada, the Charitable Divisions of CIPHI and was it's Board Treasurer for almost two decades.

During his 45 years in Environmental Public Health Tim has been recognized by his peers as recipient of several awards including the CIPHI Alex Cross Award, the President's Award from BCPHA, CIPHI EHR Award and an Environmental Leadership Award. He was also made an Honorary Citizen of the City of Winnipeg in 1981 for his contribution to public and environmental health inspection. Tim was honoured with the CIPHI Life Member award in 1995.

Tim has never lost his enthusiasm which knows no bounds and continues in as his role as CIPHI's National Historian and is Associate Editor of the BC Page produced four times a year by the CIPHI BC Branch which Tim is a contributor and also provides historical information for other Branch newsletters, the EHFC Newsletter and is a regular contributor to this newsletter produced by the Retirees Advisory Committee.

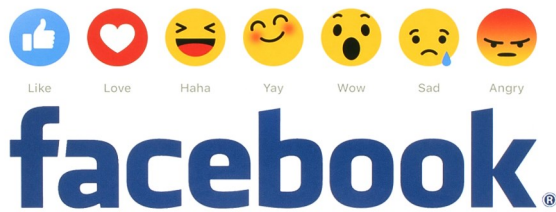
